However, this couldn't be achieved without adult volunteers; over 90% of volunteers within Scouting say that their skills and experiences have been useful in their work or personal life.

Over the last year the Group has been busy with many activities, as a Group, we have taken part in the St Georges Day parade in Lincoln and the Remembrance Sunday parade in the village. We also we did a joint Beaver and Cubs camp at the end of May. Great fun and enjoyment was had by all of the young people.

Beavers have been working on lots of badges and taking part in many activities including; code breaking, collecting for the food bank, communication, den building, first aid, healthy eating and looking after your body, knots - camp craft activity, learning sign language, making Mother's Day cards, navigation, poppy making, putting up tents and the space badge.

Ran by 20 volunteers, the Bracebridge Heath Community library has gone from strength to strength since 2015 when it reopened as a volunteer led hub. The library currently opens for 16 hours across 4 days each week and provides a valuable library service to our community as well as regular events for children and adults to get involved in.

Our successful children's story times are held on a Wednesday and Saturday once a month and are often held alongside children's craft events. Throughout the year we have held book events with children's author Julie Flanighan and historical fiction authors Joanne Major and Sarah Murden. The library also hosted a book launch for Samantha Maw's 'Goat on a Bike' poetry collection.

Recent events include our very successful Harry Potter night in February 2019 when the library welcomed many aspiring wizards and witches to make potions and learn spells. We also participated in the Summer Reading Challenge during the school summer holidays in 2018. This was really successful and many children from the local primary school took up the challenge to read six books over the summer. It is a pleasure to encourage young readers and hear about their favourite books.

He brings a wealth of experience with him, along with a great deal of enthusiasm.

It isn't just the Management Committee where you'll find our volunteers. They perform a wide variety of very valuable roles, such as our 200 Club, scoring, officiating, team management, coaching and helping us out with the facilities and the ground. Even staffing the BBQ when required. We thank everyone who volunteers as without them, we just wouldn't exist.

We reported at the last AGM that our former player, coach and groundsman had retired from duties at the club due to ill health. Vic Newman had been involved with the club for many, many years and sadly, he passed away not long after celebrating his 80th birthday at the club with family and friends. It is a sad loss and we miss him dearly. He will forever have a special place in the heart of the club

On the Senior playing side, we continue to field two Saturday and two Sunday teams. Our Youth sides competed at Under 9 through to Under 17 level. That's a lot of cricket and it takes a great deal of work to prepare and maintain the ground and playing area to the very high standard that we've come to expect at our club. The hot, dry weather made it somewhat challenging and although the turf was extremely dry and parched, we managed to keep it in a playable state.

The Seniors were very successful yet again. 2018 brought us the ECB Premier League title, the Albion Cup, the Winkworth Cup and we were champions at the Lindum CC Floodlit T20 knockout. On top of all that, we reached the quarter finals of the Vitality Club T20, a national competition, with the prestigious final held at a County ground. Despite being knocked out by Hanging Heaton CC (a very strong Yorkshire club) we were immensely proud of our achievements and we had a brilliant, well supported day at the club. It felt like another step up so hopefully we will be able to attain those heights again this season.

The Juniors continued to progress, and we are pleased that we have so many young players. Infact, in the Under 13 and Under 15 age groups, we will be putting out two teams to ensure everyone gets plenty of game time. It would be great if all these youngsters carried on developing and were able to pack out our senior teams in years to come. That's the challenge for us as a club and I know everyone involved will be working as hard as they can to achieve this.

For the youngest of the youngsters, we once again ran the ECB All Stars scheme. Devised for 5 to 8 year olds, it's a fun introduction to the game of cricket. We will be running All Stars again in 2019. Fixtures are starting to come in and all the squads are coming together ahead of the outdoor season starting in April. Outdoor training also recommences in April. If you, or a family member, wants to play cricket then get in touch with us and we can advise you of the best way to proceed. We are always looking for players of all ages.

Socially, we ran our regular events. June saw us host another Minor Counties match. The weather was great, and a large crowd came along to watch some fantastic cricket. The date for us hosting the Minor Counties match this year is 2nd June. We played host to the Stolen Fridays, our annual big outdoor event. A bumper crowd had a truly wonderful time and this year, on 15th June, we'll be doing it all over again. We even have an extra act booked to entertain the crowd at the start of the evening. Our Family Gala Day was also blessed with some great weather. Good numbers of locals came along for a relaxing family day in the sunshine. We will be running it again on 7th July, but it may be in a different format. For full details of all these events in 2019, follow our Facebook page or check our website. ## Heath U3A

At last year's meeting I reported that 2018 would see the 10th anniversary of Heath U3A and during those 10 years we had gone from strength to strength. By December 2018, we had broken the 200 barrier for membership and finished the year with 210 members. Membership is renewed over the months of January and February, and currently, at the time of writing, we have 179 members compared to 184 at this time last year. Of our current membership, 118 members are women and 61 are men. We draw our members from Bracebridge Heath, Lincoln, Waddington and North Hykeham plus the surrounding villages.

The current annual subscription is still £12 per year per person - of which a subscription fee of £3.50 is paid to our central body - the Third Age Trust. The Third Age Trust provides service to each independent U3A in the form of insurance and negotiates licensing for various media facilities at a much-reduced rate. All U3As are designed to meet the needs of those people who have entered that period of their life when they are no longer, raising a young family or following a paid profession/occupation; or are at the other end of the spectrum in finding themselves alone. Each local U3A has interest groups, run and organised by its members for its members.

Heath U3A meets once a month as a 'Branch' at The Methodist Church, when we conduct Branch business, such as, organising group membership and listening to a guest speaker from a varied and balanced programme. Our current programme includes topics : Fifty Shade of Graham; When Birds Sing; MAF (Mission Aviation Fellowship) - the airline of the church; Music from the 60's; The role of women in the war; Chatsworth House Estate; 'The big blue' - Whales and other sea life; A visit to the World's most secretive country - North Korea; The Workhouse Storytellers - from Southwell Workhouse (National Trust); Ghost Talk by Lincoln's Town Crier; The theatre and the London Palladium and Lincoln's own Ukulele Band.

Heath U3A currently has 33 active interest groups, 2 virtual groups and 3 practical help groups majoring on use of (i) the computer, (ii) E-bay and (iii) iPad/iPhone. These practical help groups can be tailored to individual needs, which are often negotiated between group leader and individual on a one-to-one basis. Activities are normally funded by the members of an interest group. For further details of what's available look on the website - [heathu3a.org.uk](http://heathu3a.org.uk) under the heading 'Groups.' Last year I reported that our Table Tennis group had had some interesting experiences at Birchwood Leisure Centre when Lincoln City Council had been refurbishing the site. The group has now relocated to Canwick Village Hall where they have been able to expand and now run four tables in the hall.

Our policy as a committee, is that if we fill a group with members, then we try to open another group to take the 'overflow.'

So there appears to me, to be good value to be had, and friendship to be found, in Heath U3A, but then I'm probably biased having been a member since 2010.

- Sessions have been gradually increasing with 23 registered 12-15 regularly attending weekly

## **Remembrance Parade, 2018**

Following changes to legislation and Lincolnshire policing structure, 2018 saw the first occasion that Bracebridge Heath organised its own Remembrance Service. This was the first time that this event would be managed and marshalled by volunteers from the Bracebridge Heath communities and Parish Council. Because of the traffic systems and road layout at the site of the memorial, the task of managing traffic safety and stoppage for this event was going to be challenging, as a Lincolnshire Police and highways safety consortium acknowledged.

Two Parish Councillors and I attended a training session provided by the road safety consortium in order to learn and be suitably qualified to plan, organise and enact an event-related road closure. Later meetings were held between our Parish Councillors, Reverend Jacqueline Bell and representatives from Lincolnshire County Council Highways and me to coordinate between the parade, service and stoppages. Closer to the time, volunteers were sought from the community to assist with marshalling the event. Two training sessions were provided to enable volunteer event marshals to learn how to safely stop traffic, learn basic two-way radio use and to allocate roles on the day.

A close eye was kept on the long-range weather forecast for the day; although we discussed the possibility of inclement weather, the volunteers agreed that they would attend and carry on their roles in all but the most inclement of weather. Thankfully, we were blessed with a fine Sunday morning for the event. The Remembrance Service passed smoothly and without difficulty. The event marshals responded admirably to their roles, as did drivers when the stoppages were put in place. General feedback after the service together with thanks given to the volunteers by attendees showed the operation to be successful; some commented on how safe they felt whilst walking in the road and gathering at the memorial.

In addition to our regular, annual services and community activities throughout 2018 St John's once again took part in the Scarecrow trail, thanks to Churchwarden Sue Shaw's hard work. We welcomed many to refreshments in church over the weekend and held a successful Summer Fair in the church carpark in August.

In 2018, sadly, the church hall was closed for Health and Safety reasons. Originally an ex-forces building purchased after the last war it was for many years the only such facility in the village and was heavily used by many village organisations. The Scouts and Cubs continued to use the building until moving to the Methodist Church hall after its closure to all further use in September 2018.

In November 2018 community volunteers assisted with road closures for the Centenary parade of Remembrance. Revd Jacqueline, Churchwardens and PCC would like to thank all concerned for their commitment to this. They would also like to thank uniformed organisations for thoughtful poppy display and contribution to this very important service and the WI for providing refreshments.

In December we welcomed once again the Bracebridge Heath Events Group Christmas Community Carol Service in church. We were delighted to join the Methodist Church and Parish Council in a Carol Service on the Green to switch on the lights of the village Christmas tree. This year as last we look forward to once again providing refreshments during the Events Group Community Egg Hunt on Easter Saturday, Children will be invited to help create the Easter Garden and take part in fun activities

As a new year begins we are delighted to welcome local choir 'Seventeen' to St John's. The choir will gather on Thursday evenings from 6.30pm to 9pm and welcome newcomers.

Church is now open to all between 9am and 5pm each weekday.

## **St John's Primary Academy**

Our school continues to do extremely well academically, but we also believe that there is much more to education than academic subjects. To that end we try and give our pupils a wide range of experiences including trips and bringing people and exhibits into the school. Recently we had the mobile planetarium set up within the hall. Our pupils are involved in raising money for charities such as the British Legion, Lincoln Larder to name but two. Through our 'St John's Values' we endeavour to encourage and foster a very good community spirit. Have you seen the new sculpture at the entrance to the school building? The leaves on the sculpture show the 'St John's Values'

Our sports teams had an exceptional year. Our netball team and two cricket teams reached the regional finals. One of the cricket teams become county champions. We have a wide range of clubs for the children to enjoy, ranging from gardening to sports and the arts.

With the increasing emphasis on the mental health and welfare of pupils we have been looking at ways we can increase the number of smaller working areas and provide dedicated areas for our lunchtime nurture groups. Some progress has been made and the next step is to look at the costs of extending our buildings to provide extra space for small groups. We are still looking for grants and other funding to achieve what we want. Our close relationship with St John's the Evangelist church next door has led to an arrangement where the church can be used on occasions for meetings or other activities.

There have been three changes in the Governing Body since last year. Mrs Tasker, Mr Newman and Mrs Hemmings resigned due to work commitments. We thank them for their service. In December we appointed two new parent governors Mrs Footsoy and Mrs McCloughlin. We still have one governor vacancy which we hope to fill in the near future.

For the second year running we have had to set a deficit budget despite cutting costs where we can. One of areas of spending that is increasing, is on the number of staff that are being appointed and trained to help pupils on a 1:1 basis. Any costs incurred before additional funding is agreed is not refunded to the school.

The governors of St John's would like to thank all those who continue to support and help our village school to thrive and be part of village life.

Lastly, we would like to thank the Parish Council for its grant towards replacing our production lighting in the school hall which has seen better days and has become 'temperamental' in its old age.
